PROGRESS UPDATE

- » First year in service: AFNWA marked its one year anniversary in full operation as our first communities, Lennox Island and Neqotkuk, confirmed their membership on March 1, 2023. At that time, four community water operators joined our staff. The AFNWA looks forward to many years of high quality service delivery in all of our member communities!
- » Bill C-61: Chief Wilbert Marshall, AFNWA Board Chair, joined Minister Patty Hajdu to support the introduction of Bill C-61 in December. Bill C-61 is an act respecting water, source water, drinking water, wastewater, and related infrastructure on First Nation lands.




» Operator training: As part of our commitment to building Indigenous capacity in communities, our operators gathered for a quarterly operators' workshop in February. In March, the team members met again in preparation of their Level 1 Water Treatment exams this March. We are all rooting for you, team!

When not at work, Adam's duties as a single fur-dad takeover, caring for his beloved 19-year-old fur baby Cleo! 
COMMUNICATIONS + OUTREACH

PROGRESS UPDATE

» First Nations Clean Water Act: In June, James MacKinnon emphasized the importance of Indigenous-developed regulations and enforcement, long-term funding, and recognition of individual wells and septic systems to the House of Commons Standing Committee on Indigenous and Northern Affairs study of Bill C-61. The FNCWA is an Act respecting water, source water, drinking water, wastewater, and related infrastructure on First Nation lands.




- » Membership: We proudly welcomed We'koqma'q as our 13th official member on July 31.
- » Elsipogtog plant and well: Congratulations to Elsipogtog community on its infrastructure upgrades. The new greensand filtration system is now online and removes manganese to acceptable levels. The new well has been running since early spring.
- » Social fund: In the past year, the AFNWA Social Committee has donated over \$13,000 to Indigenous initiatives in Mi'kmaq and Wolastoqey communities.

PROGRESS UPDATE

- » New staff: New to the team are Justin Gallant, Vacuum Truck & Jet Rod Operator; Travis Keenan, Technical Services Technologist; and Dean Perley of Negotkuk, Operator.
- » NSERC: In December 2023, the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada (NSERC) approved a \$4.3 million Alliance Grant to the Centre for Water Resources Studies (CWRS), in partnership with AFNWA and Ulnooweg Education Centre.

Our collaboration will generate innovative and knowledgeable practices, seen through the Indigenous lens. The parties' main goal is to train future Indigenous and non-Indigenous water stewards with a knowledge of Two-Eyed Seeing, guided by the Wabanaki worldview.

AFNWA and partners have also sought input of the Elders Advisory Lodge to ensure Indigenous language and traditional knowledge is at the forefront of the research.

» Minister visit: Chrystia Freeland, Finance Minister and Deputy Prime Minister, recently toured the Centre for Water Resources Studies (CWRS) at Dalhousie University to highlight Budget 2024. Susheel Arora, CEO, and James MacKinnon, Engagement & Government Relations Director, joined the Minister in emphasizing the AFNWA partnership with CWRS.

John Lam, P. Eng. Director of Engineering

Having joined AFNWA in November 2020,
John oversees our asset management,
master planning, capital improvement planning, and provision of technical services. In his 30+ years of consulting engineering, John acquired significant expertise

in various water and wastewater treatment technologies.

After graduating from University of New Brunswick with a bachelor's degree in civil engineering, John worked across Canada for provincial and territorial governments. In the Northwest Territories, he was the project officer and then regional municipal engineer.

His contributions to engineering include development of innovative enhancements to treatment technologies including disposal of treated effluent using evapotranspiration, greenhouse wastewater treatment, and engineered spring/siphon for water supply. As a Class I Wastewater Treatment Operator, John operated up to 20 wastewater treatment plants in Bermuda and Mi'kma'ki, developing and delivering technical and continuing education training courses for post-secondary institutions and NGOs.

He was the lead author for the Atlantic Canada Wastewater Guidelines Manual for Collection, Treatment, and Disposal (2006), and is a steering committee member for the current update of both the water and wastewater guidelines. John also was a Wastewater Program Lead with Environment Nova Scotia.

John offers the following advice to Indigenous youth and students: "Be confident in yourself and your community. Be aware that there are many cheering you on, including friends outside of your community, myself included. You may need to get outside of your comfort zone. It will be worth it."

AFNWA would like to share that John will soon make a major shift in his role as Director of Engineering. Our great friend is retiring this winter, AFNWA will be forever grateful for John's contributions to the communities, our organization, and the discipline of engineering.

- » Canada-Australia Dialogue Sessions: In November, James MacKinnon, Director of Engagement & Government Relations introduced AFNWA at the Canada-Australia dialogue sessions. This gathering, hosted by Deputy Minister of Indigenous Services Canada, Gina Wilson, and CEO of the National Indigenous Australians Agency, Jody Broun, strengthens Canada's bilateral relationship with Australia and open continuous dialogue.
- » CBWM & Operator Workshop: The annual Community Based Water Monitor & Operator Workshop took place on November 19–21 in Millbrook. Participants heard from AFNWA

- staff and industry experts on various topics including our oversight standards, waterborne illnesses, and how climate change affects water treatment. The awards dinner celebrated the monitors who completed 100 per cent of their annual sampling and we thank them for their dedicated work. 
