AFNWA will be responsible for the operation, maintenance, and capital upgrades of all water and wastewater assets in each participating First Nations community. We are committed to helping build stronger First Nations communities in Atlantic Canada, and supporting long-term planning initiatives.

The Atlantic First Nations Water Authority is honoured to share the news that two more communities have confirmed their desire to explore membership in AFNWA and to participate in our Asset Management Plans [AMP]. We welcome Wagmatcook and We'koqma'q to the AFNWA journey, and look forward to working in the communities as we move towards full operations. All five Unama'ki bands are now AFNWA AMP participants!

In May, our team was delighted to be recognized at the **Canadian Network of Asset Managers Tereo Awards**. John Lam, Manager of Engineering, accepted the **Innovator Award** for AFNWA, which is awarded to "an organization successfully developing and implementing Asset Management approaches to effect business improvement."

The Operations and Engineering Department are working with the Dalhousie Centre for Water Resource Studies [CWRS] on our water sampling program that will see the team visit several Wabanaki communities over the next several months. Starting in June with Glooscap First Nation, the joint project involves acquiring multiple water samples on a quarterly basis in several Mi'kmaq and Wolastogey communities.

AFNWA and CWRS were also highlighted at the International Water Association's **Water Safety Conference 2022** recently held in Narvik, Norway. Tiannie Paul, Operations Engineer, and Megan Fuller, Dalhousie University, offered a visual presentation on **Two-Eyed Seeing: Development of One Water Safety Plans**.

Lauren Mills and Adam Gould answered questions from intrigued students, elected councillors, band staff, and even other exhibitors. The opportunity also allowed us to share QR codes for instant access to our social media apps.
