
#### **2021 PROGRESS UPDATE**

- » AFNWA congratulates departed Board member Roger Augustine on his recent retirement. Roger's career spanned over 40 years where he was elected Chief of Eel Ground First Nation, and most recently spent almost 13 years as AFN Regional Chief for New Brunswick and PEI.
- » The Board approved the following policies at recent meetings: Occupational Health and Safety (OSH), Flextime, Fraud, Whistleblower, Asset Management, Privacy, Code of Conduct and Conflict of Interest, COVID-19 Vaccination, and IT. AFNWA policies are added to our website upon Board approval.
- » We welcomed Mark MacDonald to the Engineering Department in December 2021. Mark is our new Asset Management Technologist, and 21st staff member.



» The Operations Department is hosting Safety Update meetings on Tuesday mornings. The weekly gatherings, hosted by Safety and Security Coordinator Mark Geck, share info and advice on how we can work individually and collectively to keep ourselves and teammates safe and healthy. All AFNWA staff are fully vaccinated against COVID-19 and have completed First Aid Training.

- » AFNWA continues to complete projects and achieve new milestones by finalizing the Asset Management Plans [AMPs] and Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition Master Plan. Dillon Consulting completed 17 community AMPs as the SCADA Master Plan was carried out by Eramosa Engineering. AFNWA, in partnership with the First Nations Infrastructure Institute is working to complete a cost recovery pilot with Paqtnkek First Nation regarding infrastructure associated with economic growth.
- » Atlantic Canada Water Works Association presented AFNWA with its 2021 Project of the Year award (Small Project Category) for our SCADA Master Plan.
- » Our Ten-Year Capital and Operations Budget was submitted to ISC in December upon invitation from the Government of Canada for consideration in the 2022-23 federal budget.



» Indigenous Services Canada Minister Patty Hajdu accepted a

request from the AFNWA Board Chair Chief Wilbert Marshall to discuss the AFNWA journey in recognition of our common vision for self-determination and capacity building within First Nations. The discussion was positive and the Minister will continue to support and monitor our progress!

Mohamed Osman, Project Engineer

AFNWA's Project Engineer, Mohamed Osman, has been passionate about math and drawing since he was a young boy growing up in Sudan. Following in his father's and grandfather's footsteps, Mohamed studied civil engineering at the University of Khartoum.

Upon graduating, Mohamed began work as a construction engineer in Sudan's oil and gas sector. It was in this role that he discovered a keen interest in environmental engineering as it combined his love of nature and math. In 2003, he moved to Riyadh, Saudi Arabia for work and later completed his Master's (2006) and Ph.D. in Environmental Engineering (2013) at King Saud University. He continued his work as an environmental engineer while teaching Environmental Engineering at KSU.

In 2020, Mohamed, his wife, and their two daughters immigrated to Canada. They chose Canada because they were looking for a home where they would find peace, a better quality of life, respect for cultural diversity, and be surrounded by nature. When he first arrived in Halifax, Mohamed worked as an interim environmental analyst with the NS Department of Environment before joining AFNWA in January 2021 as an Asset Management Technologist. Six months later, he was promoted to his current role as Project Manager. Last summer, Mohamed earned his Professional Engineer designation.

As a project engineer, Mohamed oversees a range of capital projects and plays a key role in the asset management program related to AFNWA's infrastructure. Mohamed's duties include managing projects from beginning to end—including



concept development, project design oversight, tender process management, construction management, and facilities commissioning.

Mohamed believes that the success of one of us at AFNWA is the success of all of us. "We are paving the way to create a successful model embedded with values from First Nations cultures." Mohamed is looking forward to ever-increasing engagement with AFNWA's operators as he shares his expertise and learns from the "real champions" of safe drinking water and expert wastewater management.

A lifelong lover of learning, Mohamed wants to learn as much as he can about Indigenous culture. Outside of work, he balances his very busy life by spending quality time with his family, reading, visiting nature, walking on trails, talking with friends, and going to the gym. Eventually, he hopes to travel throughout Canada, discovering new places and meeting new people.

#### **2022 PROGRESS UPDATES**

**World Water Day** was March 22<sup>nd</sup> and we celebrated together with community water operators at our latest **Operators Workshop**. AFNWA noted the continued attendance of Dale Ward, the only Indigenous woman who is currently serving her community as a water operator in Atlantic Canada. AFNWA plans to develop initiatives that will direct women and girls to pursue studies and careers in STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math). The next Operators Workshop will be in June with details to come.

Our team welcomed Mark E. MacDonald in March as Technical Services Technologist. He will work directly with Jeff Wujcik, Superintendent of Technical Services, in our Operations Department.

On April 7<sup>th</sup>, the federal government released **Budget 2022**, which proposed to provide Indigenous Services Canada with an additional **\$173.2 million over 10 years** starting in 2022–23 to support the transfer of water and wastewater services in Wabanaki communities to AFNWA. Following a news release, interim CEO Carl Yates, interim COO James MacKinnon, Board Chair Chief Wilbert Marshall, and Vice-Chair Chief Ross Perley were featured in interviews with CBC, SaltWire, Global News, and Brunswick News. Following the budget announcement, Chief Wilbert, Carl, and James also enjoyed a supportive conversation with Indigenous Services Minister, Patty Hajdu.

On April 20<sup>th</sup>, Crown-Indigenous Relations **Minister Marc Miller** attended our **Agreements Workshop** with Chiefs in Dartmouth. Joining him were Members of Parliament Kody Bloise (Kings-Hants) and Jaime Battiste (Sydney-Victoria).

The Association of Consulting Engineering Companies – New Brunswick presented its **2022 Engineering Excellence Award** to Dillon Consulting Ltd. and AFNWA. John Lam attended the ACEC-NB event along with Dillon's Julie DiCicco, Ryan Dunbar, and Angel Ransom of the First Nations Major Project Coalition (pictured below from left to right).



AFNWA is currently working with Dalhousie University's **Centre for Water Resources Studies (CWRS)** on regulatory compliance operations plans, and needs the assistance of two Indigenous students for **summer internships**. Interns will work closely with Dalhousie and AFNWA staff to conduct drinking water sampling and learn about data collection and analysis. James Trimble, Manager of Operations

James "Jim" Trimble joined AFNWA in April 2021 as Manager of Operations, bringing over 30 years of water and wastewater management experience in Indigenous communities. As leader of the Operations team, he ensures that all operators are fully trained and licensed and that water, wastewater treatment plants, and related infrastructure are operated and maintained to industry standards. His responsibilities also include oversight for quality assurance and quality control to ensure AFNWA delivers on its mission to provide high quality drinking water and wastewater services that meet the highest standards in the land.

Before AFNWA, Jim was Director of Capital and Public Works at Beausoleil First Nation, an Ojibwe community on Christian Island, ON. In his 11 years there, he was dedicated to solving issues in water and wastewater such as lack of operator training resources and securing funding for capital projects, operations, and maintenance activities. One of his major accomplishments prior to his tenure in Beausoleil was with Nunatsiavut in Labrador where he was the lead on the construction of facilities in Torngat Mountains National Park.

James is the father of seven and resides in Woodstock, NB, with his wife of 29 years and their two youngest children. The Trimbles are designated as a level three foster home to help First Nations youth.



The Operations and Engineering Department are working with the Dalhousie Centre for Water Resource Studies [CWRS] on our water sampling program that will see the team visit several Wabanaki communities over the next several months. Starting in June with Glooscap First Nation, the joint project involves acquiring multiple water samples on a quarterly basis in several Mi'kmaq and Wolastoqey communities.

AFNWA and CWRS were also highlighted at the International Water Association's Water Safety Conference 2022 recently held in Narvik, Norway. Tiannie Paul, Operations Engineer, and Megan Fuller, Dalhousie University, offered a visual presentation on *Two-Eyed Seeing: Development of One Water Safety Plans.*

Lauren Mills and Adam Gould answered questions from intrigued students, elected councillors, band staff, and even other exhibitors. The opportunity also allowed us to share QR codes for instant access to our social media apps. Following our successful sponsorships in the spring, our team looks forward to supporting more events over the summer. In July, Potlotek hosted the **Nova Scotia Mi'kmaw Summer Games** with support from AFNWA as Ti'am Sponsor. - » On November 7, AFNWA made history with the signing of the Service Delivery Transfer Agreement with The Honourable Patty Hajdu, Minister of Indigenous Services Canada (ISC). Joined by her team, Minister Hajdu joined Board Chair, Chief Wilbert Marshall, Interim CEO Carl Yates, and Interim COO James MacKinnon to affirm the ministerial transfer of responsibilities. Chair of the Elders Advisory Lodge, Methilda Knockwood-Snache, provided an opening water ceremony and presented the Minister with an eagle feather and Chief Marshall with a rattle.
- » We have completed all hiring leading up to the formal community membership phase, welcoming six new team members to our growing family: Alex Davis, Planning & Development Engineer; Chandler Fraser, Junior IT Coordinator; Margie Hennigar, Controller; Dan MacDonald, Safety & Security Coordinator; Wanda Ralph, Procurement Officer; Micah Reid, Utility Tech.
- » The AFNWA Board grew by two members in fall. Joining us are AFN Regional Chief for New Brunswick, Joanna Bernard, and Dr. Shelley Denny, Director of Aquatic Research and Stewardship, with the Unama'ki Institute of Natural Resources.

A Mi'kmaw from the Miawpukek First Nation in Newfoundland, Alex was raised by his grandparents in a small community on the south coast. Ever since he was a young child, Alex has loved building things out of whatever materials were on hand, such as the cardboard boxes that Christmas presents came in. Helping his grandfather fix and build things around the house also sparked his interest in engineering. With support from both grandparents, Alex pursued engineering immediately after high school, graduating from Dalhousie University in 2015 with a Bachelor of Engineering, specializing in Industrial Engineering.

As AFNWA's Planning and Development Engineer, Alex works with member communities to support their planning for current and

future residential and commercial needs. This includes helping Identify areas where present water and wastewater networks can be expanded and ensuring adequate capacities in the water supply and wastewater systems. His primary goals are to learn more about his Mi'kmaw culture and to ensure the communities we serve have the resources they need for their development.

Alex resides in Enfield, NS, with his partner and their three children. When he's not at the office, he enjoys a cup of tea while tinkering on backyard building projects in the company of his dogs, spending time with his family, and, when time permits, exploring the backcountry on his bike.
